Report on Student feedback forms (Annexure i)

The feedback respondents represented a cross section of students from almost every semester, department and stream. This has made the feedback comprehensive and very relevant as each stream and is adequately covered.

The first year students who have recently joined the college have responded according to their initial perceptions and first impressions and their candour and frankness are quite telling.

The second year students have spent more than an year in the college and so have not only knowledge about the systems and the way the college operates, but also have had the opportunity to evaluate, discuss and suggest ways and means to improve the same.

The third year and MA students have more maturity and have responded with concern and positivity. They have a sense of identification with their alma mater and so are very keen to see it touch even newer heights of achievement.

The feedback questions were wide ranging and covered every aspect of the college including the faculty, curriculum, extra- curricular activities, infrastructure, recreation and catering facilities. The students were asked to indicate their degree of agreement with the statement on a range of 1-4 with the higher score indicating stronger agreement. A brief summary of the feedback received is recorded below.

<u>1. Curriculum, Teaching, Learning and evaluation</u>

This section dealt with the faculty involvement, preparedness and teaching methodology. By and large, the students affirm that faculty comes well prepared and cover the syllabus on time. Most have registered their score in the 3 and 4 range of satisfaction.

It can be inferred that the students will be happier if the teachers were to pay more personal attention to academically weaker students and adopt more innovative teaching methodologies.

2. Infrastructure

a) Library

Almost 85% of the students opine that Library has an excellent collection of books and attitude of the support staff is good. They also are happy with the Xerox facility there. Many students have expressed their need for a reading room which would materialise soon with the planned expansion of the library area.

b) Canteen

The canteen is a popular area of the college, and most agree that food is nutritious and tasty. Most respondents are happy that junk food is being replaced with healthier food options.

c) Banking

Facilities are adequate and staff is supportive.

d) Toilets and water facility

A majority of respondents are satisfied with water facilities available in the campus. They have expressed the need for more toilets, a project which is in the pipeline.

e) Medical facilities

Majority are happy with the facilities and medical staff and consider them to be performing well.

f) Sports

The sports department gets great feedback as both the sports facilities and the staff gets an average of 3 and 4 scores. Motivation by the staff and equipment and playgrounds are highly appreciated.

g) Internet Centre

Students seem to be satisfied with the internet facilities and have given an average ranking of 3 to the internet centre.

III) Governance and Management

The Head of the Institution and Departmental Heads have received a high ranking in terms of approachability and efficiency. The students seem to feel that they can approach the Principal and Department Heads easily with the assurance that their grievances and issues will be sympathetically and fully redressed to their satisfaction. The administrative staff has also been ranked in the 3 and 4 grades of approval.

IV) Student support

60% of the respondents approve the student support facilities available in the college. 40% of the students feel that there could be enhancement in the add-on college courses, promotion of student participation and functioning of student council. The students seem to be happy with the anti-ragging policy but want more skill development courses.

Summary

In conclusion, it can be evaluated that the satisfaction levels of the student community as regards key areas such as academic, infrastructure and management are very high. They are taking note of the painstaking efforts of the management and staff to establish and maintain even higher standards of achievement in the college.

Students seem to have high expectations from the college, since the repute and renown of this great institution is universal and are keen to extract the maximum benefit from their association

here as students and later alumnas of the college. There is a general approval of the policies and programmes and a sense of participation and contribution that demarcates all great institutions from all the key stakeholders such as the students, staff, management and parents. This feedback exercise has provided valuable inputs and shone the spotlight on areas where even greater efforts will yield better results. A suggestion is that open discussion and feedback session can be organized wherein the students can voice more concerns and opinions in a constructive and positive atmosphere.

	its responsibility of producing thoughtful citizens who think beyond their own selves. Parents seemed visibly happy with their children's involvement in the realm of social work which would turn them into thoughtful citizens.
07	Infrastructure Facilities including Library and Labs
	Parents appreciated the existing infrastructure facilities but insisted that more washrooms/ toilets should be constructed. In response to the parents concerns, the college plans to construct more washrooms under RUSA grant and renovations are going on for existing toilets.
08	Support Services like Bank, Canteen, Student Center, Career Counseling Cell etc.
	College has a sound infrastructure which not only caters to academic needs of the students but also help them in many other ways. It provides them multiple ways of recreation. Parents seemed pleased with the infrastructure facilities which ease out their children's life away from home.
09	Extra -Curricular Activities
	The parents suggested that there should be an internal engineering for the students by introducing value based education. In response to this college started Arya Yuvti Samaj in which havan and value based lectures are given on the first of every month. Parents wanted self defense training for their wards. And for this college has started taekwondo.
10	Value Based Education
	Parents believed that MCM provides their children with the best of both worlds; tradition and modernity, here go hand in hand.
11	Discipline Practices
	The college holds on to its commitment of raising disciplined students who, in the coming future would turn into responsible citizens. Parents' gratitude was visible in their honest compliments and warm gestures where they believed in teachers' untiring efforts and constant guidance.





Student Support and Progression

2016-17 Demand Ratio



5.11 Student organized/initiatives:

Students organized an annual cultural two day fest 'Meraki 2017' on 18th and 19th February 2017. This witnessed the participation of 30 colleges across the tricity. A number of celebrities were invited and Meraki offered an array of events to engage, empower and encourage the youthful participants. The students collected an amount of Rs 3,00,800 from sponsorships in this mega event. They saved Rs 1 Lakh and donated it for a social cause.

5.12 No. of social initiatives undertaken by the students

- Social initiatives were undertaken by the students under the MCM Rotaract Club and the NSS. These include donation of Rs 20,000 to Sahayta for cancer patients, celebration of World Organ donation day, Health and Cleanliness drive on 30th and 31st August, 2016, Blood Donation camp, Clothes & Books collection drive on 3rd and 4th September, Rotaract Princess event on 19th September,2016 for raising funds for the welfare of destitute children, Diwali celebrations in slums by distributing gifts, Fund raiser event, Dance workshop for the children of SOREM and Prabh Asraa, participation in Walkathon organized by Fortis and NDTV for organ donation, Stem cell seminar, A-dayout with six kids from Rwanda having heart transplantation, Positive Thinking workshop, Baisakhi celebrations with the unprivileged children, Flash mob for showing solidarity for women safety.
- NSS units of MCM DAV have also taken various initiatives for different social causes. Rallies were organized for blood donation, prevention of AIDS, Saving the girl child and organ donation. Volunteers participated in the International Yoga day and a 30 days Yoga camp organized in college. To inculcate patriotism among volunteers, they were encouraged to participate in Republic day parade, Tiranga March and Quami Ekta. Volunteers were given legal information about certain laws and regulations about domestic violence cases. A lecture on stress management was also organized. A workshop was organized to teach the volunteers skills to convert waste materials into useful products. Digital Literacy drive was organized to teach the techniques of digital transactions to be used by members of different strata of society. Volunteers also participated in Pulse Polio drive.
- The MCM Alumni at their annual meet in 2017 supported the cause of 'Solar Energy'. The event included 'A Walk for a Cause' and a signature campaign was launched to pledge their commitment towards the use of solar power. The Association donated two

solar cookers and food supplies worth Rs. 11000/- to 'The Kitchen', run by 'Samarpan', an NGO which is run by an alumna for the upliftment of underprivileged children. An alumna donated Rs.1,00,000/- for nurturing the talent of music in the College.

5.13 Major grievances of students (if any) redressed

- The college has a Students Grievance Redressal Cell and Hostel Grievance Redressal Cell that lends a hand to the students in their psychological, social, emotional and other day to day concerns. Some of the areas addressed and strengthened during the current session are provision of Wi-Fi facility, laundry facility, and variety in hostel menu, increased number of night-outs, and maintenance and repair of washrooms. It has noted the demand for separate reading rooms, common room, more area for college book store, more photocopy shops, relaxation in college timings, separate section for CA students, more dustbins and notice boards, more study tables and sockets in hostel rooms, more sports activities, more water coolers, and to increase the number of hours for library use. Most of the issues were resolved in the best possible way.
- The Internal Complaints Committee received complaints from two students which were redressed to the satisfaction of the aggrieved students.



Governance Leadership and Management

Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision: To make Mehr Chand Mahajan DAV College a 'Total Quality Zone' by imparting quality education at all levels to produce 'Women of Substance' who can face the challenges of globalization in the 21st century.

Mission: To create young minds with a quest for excellence and a sense of self- evaluative accountability, and chisel them into socially responsible, morally upright, innovative women leaders, administrators, and policy makers who can contribute constructively to the task of nation-building.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

MIS System has been activated. Examination, Admission and Alumni modules have been made functional.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Dr.Nisha Bhargava (Principal) is a member of four faculties of Panjab University namely:
 - 1 Medical Sciences
 - 2 Arts
 - 3 Commerce & Management
 - 4 Education
- Dr. Nisha Bhargava (Principal) and Dr. Vibha Sharma are members of CBCS Committee (BA) of the Panjab University.
- During the year 2016-17, 02 faculty members became members of various Boards of Studies that prepare and revise curriculum for the students at various levels. The total number of faculty on various board of studies is 9.
- Since the College is affiliated to Panjab University, teachers follow the curriculum provided by the University but have autonomy to plan the teaching strategy, termwise syllabus and to allocate research projects to students to promote undergraduate research.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Teachers are encouraged to regularly participate in Faculty Development Programmes.
- During 2016-17, two 7- day Faculty Development Programmes were held, one of which was under RUSA from 26thNovember-2nd December, 2016 and the other was held at the national level from 13th-19th April, 2016 respectively.

- A one-day RUSA sponsored workshop on 'Stress Management' was held for the faculty and support staff on 30th December, 2016. The Department of English organized an inter-college RUSA sponsored workshop on 'Translation: Technicalities and Challenges' on 13th February 2017.
- Students also gained through various workshops and programmes.
- A two- day workshop on 'Android Application Development' was organized for students in February, 2017.
- 7-day RUSA sponsored Remedial classes for students of Commerce and 10-day remedial classes on Statistics were conducted for students of Public Administration in November 2016.
- 10-day UGC NET Coaching classes for Paper I were also conducted during November 2016.
- The students also attended a research oriented workshop on 'Production of Natural Vinegar' held at PAU, Ludhiana.
- A 3-day workshop on 'Fundamentals of Statistics using SPSS' was organized under RUSA in February 2017.
- In addition, workshops in the fields of Cosmetology, Music, and Public Administration were held in March 2017.
- Quiz contests were organized by the departments of Political Science and Economics
- RUSA also sponsored a visit of students of Police Administration to the Central Detective Training School, Government of India in March 2017.
- The teachers usually go beyond the prescribed syllabi by interlinking it with other disciplines and assigning research projects beyond the syllabus.
- Faculty members take classes across disciplines to foster inter- disciplinary thrust.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Professionals are invited from time to time to apprise the students of ways to handle stress, examination fear, peer pressure and other such problems.
- MIS module of examination has been activated.
- During examinations, differently-abled students are accommodated on the ground floor and provided wheel chair if needed.

- Objective peer evaluation is encouraged in some classes which improves the class atmosphere and clarifies the concepts better.
- In order to maintain complete transparency, the students are shown their answer-sheets of house examinations.
- Internal Assessment is also displayed on the notice board before being submitted to the University.
- The parents of students are informed about the performance of their wards in the House examinations.
- Students are regularly apprised of their attendance in various classes

6.3.4 Research and Development

In order to encourage research and development:

- The College publishes a UGC approved and refereed Research Journal "New Horizons" (ISSN No : 2277-5218).
- The College management has earmarked Rs. 20 Lakh as seed money for research.
- INFLIBNET and DELNET services are available.
- Seminars and workshops are regularly held at the College to promote research.
- All students at PG level and in some UG subjects are assigned research based assignments.
- Inductive teaching as a method of instruction is encouraged.
- Students are motivated to present papers at Conferences/Seminars and publish them in reputed Journals. This year, 20 students published papers in reputed journals.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Teaching aids such as overhead projectors (18), computers (85), laptops (9), LED screens (3), camera (1),printers (15), UPS (20), visualizer, and Wi-Fi facility in laboratories are available for the faculty and students to improve the teaching learning process.
- To cope up with the increase in number of students, new furniture and facilities, such as display rack (1), cabinets (2), wooden tables (2), library bookshelves (11), training

chairs (30), steel storage racks (8), steel almirahs (11), display cabinets (12), revolving chair (1), chairs and tables(30), magazine racks (3), facial bed (1), armrest chairs (24), blackboards (3), podiums(9), garden benches (124), compactors (1), storage cabinets(6), wooden work station (2), wooden tables (21), trophy shelves (6), chrome plated chairs (280), lecture stands (20), pin boards (42), lab stools (25), computer tables (8),water dispensers (10), and bulletin boards (2) were procured this year.

- In addition, students' washrooms were renovated for better facilitation and new washrooms were constructed for the differently abled as well as for the bank which is within the college premises.
- Nine departmental staff rooms, 5 new class rooms, 1 room each for NCC and NSS, and four new storage spaces were created.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The College takes decisions pertaining to the addition of teaching and non- teaching staff within the parameters provided by UGC, Panjab University, and the DAV College Managing Committee.
- The process of recruitment of new faculty is initiated through advertisements in major dailies of the region to attract best talent.
- Regular performance appraisal of teaching and non-teaching staff is done.
- Members of the faculty are assigned rotational duties in various clubs and committees to benefit from their extra-academic proficiency in diverse fields.
- Teachers are encouraged to go for periodic training through Orientation/Refresher Courses/Faculty Development Programmes and Staff Training Courses for their Professional Development.
- Staff members are given appreciation letters and honoured for their achievements and performance.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

In this session, 94 appointments of faculty on Contract and 1 on Permanent basis were made.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Company executives, Directors and Entrepreneurs were invited to the College to interact and share knowledge with students and the faculty members.

Students were taken for Industry and field visits for first-hand experience and skill enhancement.

To promote linkages with Industry, membership of prestigious bodies like CII has been acquired. Further, the college is also a member of Indian Women Network, CII. A workshop on Renewable Energy in coordination with CII was held during the session. The Department of MFT signed MOUs with Cremica and MDRL.

Add-on courses to hone entrepreneurial skills are available.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The College follows Panjab University guidelines for admissions to different courses with regard to minimum eligibility criteria, compartment cases, and reservations in different categories.

Admission is done on the basis of merit and academic record of students. There is a minimum cut off for elective subjects, honours and Post-graduation. During the session 2016-17, 5385 students were admitted to various courses.

The college follows the reservation policy for SC, ST, disabled students and various quotas as per Chandigarh Administration/UGC Norms/ PU norms.

At the time of admission, the applicants are counselled by senior students and the faculty regarding the choice of subjects/stream/add-on courses.

PPTs prepared by various departments are run at the time of admissions for the benefit of the students to make them aware about various courses/subjects.

A havan is performed in the beginning of each session. The students under the aegis of the Arya Yuvti Samaj perform havans every month and participate in spiritual discussions.

Induction day is organized for freshers of all streams, during which a detailed presentation on all the Add –on Courses available in the College, is made for their benefit.

• Fee concessions are given to the wards of all permanent employees.

- Rs 3,29,400/- was contributed towards premium of Group Insurance Scheme for teaching and non-teaching staff.

- 5 % of teaching staff availed loan facility during 2016-17.
- Subsidized medical and dental facility is provided to staff members and their families.

Non-teaching:

- Staff accommodation has been provided to 11 employees (5 office staff members and 6 hostel wardens).
- Loans from the Employee Provident Fund for marriage, higher education of children and purchase of vehicle, and construction of house are available.
- 20% non-teaching staff availed loan facility during 2016-17.
- Uniforms are provided to Class IV employees periodically.
- Subsidized medical and dental facility is provided to staff members and their wards.

Welfare Schemes for Students

- Merit cum need based scholarships offered by College to meritorious/deserving students belonging to economically weaker sections. Free books are provided to these students if sought for.
- Substantial refreshment is provided to all the students participating in various extracurricular activities.
- Students have been provided with value added services such as a shopping area within the campus, medical and dental facilities and wi-fi facility in the hostel.
- Self defence training, Yoga classes and a gymnasium are also provided to the students.
- Arya Yuvti Samaj conducts havan in the beginning of every month.

Two alumnae donated Rs.1,00,000/- each for nurturing the talent of music in the College. The Association donated two solar cookers and food supplies worth Rs. 11000/- to 'The Kitchen', run by Samarpan, an NGO for the upliftment of underprivileged children.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

• The Parent Teacher Association held its annual meeting to gather feedback regarding the infrastructure, academic and other policies of the college.

- The Executive Committee of PTA was constituted and a comprehensive report of the issues and viewpoints raised during the meeting was compiled for future perusal.
- Suggestion boxes have been placed in the campus for inputs from students and parents alike.
- The teachers hold informal discussions with the parents about their wards' attendance and their academic progress.
- The parents of students are encouraged to remain in touch with the principal/faculty to discuss the progress of their wards.
- Everyday 10.00 -11.00 am is the scheduled time for the students to meet the principal and discuss any issue.
- The feedback from Parent Teacher Association has been obtained during the Parent Teacher Association Meet and has been attached as Annexure ii in criterion
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6.13 Development programmes for support staff

- A one-day RUSA sponsored workshop on 'Stress Management' was held for the support staff on 30th December, 2016.
- A seven day workshop on Digital Literacy was organized by the Department of Computer Science.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

- 3 solar power plants of 20 KWP each have been installed. In addition, work on 80 KWP is in progress.
- Sinks discarded after renovation of Chemistry labs are used as flower beds.
- E-waste bins have been installed in the college premises and students are encouraged to dispose off e-waste in them.
- Four solar lights of high luminosity have been installed in the college.
- Sensitization of stakeholders about energy conservation through lectures, workshops, and seminars was done.
- The hostel is supported by Solar heating systems for providing hot water to residents.

- A Green House in the 'Rishi Vatika' of the college, and a vermi composting unit in the Botanical Garden produces organic manure out of hostel and canteen waste by using earthworms. Organic manure was sold to those interested.
- The college conducts various tree plantation drives every year under the aegis of its Environment Committee, Science association, NSS, Rotaract etc.
- Medicinal and herbal plants are not only planted on campus but also distributed among faculty members and students free of cost for a greener future.
- Aquatic ecosystem pond has been set up with the help of Department of Zoology, Panjab University, in the botanical garden.

Context

- Students must be aware of changes at the national level and must be instrumental in the smooth transition of the social space.

The Practice

The college has kept pace with the changed economic, social and cultural milieu and has been organizing events that provide a platform to students to remain abreast of these developments and contribute in them as agents of the change.

NSS

Energy Efficient Practices

Objective of the practice

- To march towards energy efficient systems.
- To safeguard the environment for a healthy future.
- To create an eco-friendly learning environment.

Context

- The environment is facing a dreadful threat from technological advancements.
- Energy efficient systems are the only hope

The Practice

The institution remains committed to the cause of environmental preservation and has established a rain water harvesting unit. In addition to this, several other initiatives have been taken to reinforce the ecological balance.

Renewable Energy

- The Renewable Energy Committee got installed 3 solar power plants of 20 kwp each. In addition, work on 80 kwp is in process.A subsidy of 30% has been given by Chandigarh Renewable Energy, Science and Technology (CREST). It is a grid interactive power plant which has resulted in reduction of electricity bill.
- Solar lights of high luminosity have been installed in the college.

AMDA (Association of MCM DAV Alumni)

- A 'Walk for a Cause' was organized to generate awareness and willingness to use solar power.
- Two solar cookers and food supplies worth Rs. 11000/- were donated to The Kitchen, managed by an NGO, Samarpan, dedicated for the uplift of underprivileged children.

CII (Confederation of Indian Industry)

- The committee attended a group discussion on "Chandigarh as a Smart City" and a convention on "Building Innovative and Disruptive Technology" in August 2016.
- Real Time Air Quality Monitoring system was installed in the college, a first of its kind in an educational institution in the country.

Environment Committee

- Van Mahotsav celebrated on 4th August, 2016, by planting 300 plants including herbs.
- Events like Slogan Writing and Poster Making Competitions were organized to promote a "Plastic free campus" and "Save water" on 2nd November 2016.

Evidence of success

- The college has become the first academic institution of the country to have a Real Time Air Quality Monitoring Sensors.
- The stakeholders are clearly enthusiastic about the cause and have become more careful in the use of natural resources.
- The carbon footprint of the college has gone considerably low.

Problems Encountered:

• Transition to the energy- efficient system often requires renovation and fundamental architectural support which proves to be a time- consuming and a taxing proposition in monetary terms.
