



5.6 Details of student counselling and career guidance

- MOU with M/S Raj Malhotra's IAS Study Centre for Civil Services Training.
- MOU with Realpro Management and Skill School, Chandigarh to provide in-house Skill development Training.
- A Personality Development session was conducted by the experts of Career Launcher for 50 students of BBA-II on 16 Sept 2017. The session was designed to emphasize the nuances of communication skills, interview concepts and group discussion in the Job Selection Process.
- Career Counselling Workshop followed by Skill Test was held on 9th Feb 2018. Mr VikasOhri, corporate trainer from Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS) gave a talk on Career options and guided the students about how to take timely decision regarding the right career choice. The workshop was attended by 57 students of various streams of graduation. 5.11 Student organized/initiatives:

Students organized an annual cultural two-day fest 'Meraki 2018' on 21th and 22th March 2018. This event had participation from 30 colleges across the tricity. A number of celebrities were invited and it offered an array of events to engage, empower and encourage the participants. The students collected an approximate amount of Rs. 3,16,000 from sponsorships in this mega event. They saved Rs.1,62,500 and deposited the amount in the college for varied social outreach endeavours.

5.12 No. of social initiatives undertaken by the students

Social initiatives undertaken by the students are as follows.

- The Women Development Cell organized various activities related to social issues

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teachers are encouraged to regularly participate in Faculty Development Programmes and Short Term Courses.

 During 2017-18, a 7 day workshop on Digital Literacy for teaching and non teaching employees of the college was organized by the Department of Computer Science and Application from January 2-10, 2018

- A 7 day training programme for Women- "Hastkala (Developing Skills in Fabric Ornamentation)" was organized in June 2018.
- MIS workshops for the teaching and non-teaching staff were organised on April 4,
 April 11 and April 13, 2018.
- A number of workshops were organized by various departments of the college on eclectic topics like:

 - o Chemistry and Its Multi-disciplinary Facets,

 - Textile Painting and Designing

- The teachers usually go beyond the prescribed syllabi by interlinking it with other disciplines and assigning research projects beyond the syllabus.
- Faculty members take classes across disciplines to foster inter- disciplinary thrust.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Professionals are invited from time to time to apprise the students of ways to handle stress, examination fear, peer pressure and other such problems. These issues have been addressed through the mentorship programme also.
- MIS module of examination has been activated.
- During examinations, differently-abled students are accommodated on the ground floor and provided wheel chair if required.

- Objective peer evaluation is encouraged in some classes which improves the class atmosphere and clarifies the concepts better.
- The evaluation process includes the following
 - Mid-semester exams
 - Class tests at regular intervals
 - Assignments and projects
 - Presentations
- In order to maintain complete transparency, the students are shown their answersheets of house examinations.
- Internal Assessment is also displayed on the notice board before being submitted to the Panjab University.
- The parents of students are informed about the performance of their wards in the House examinations.
- Students are regularly apprised of their attendance in various classes

6.3.4 Research and Development

In order to encourage Research and Development:

- The College publishes a double blind peer reviewed, multidisciplinary research journal "New Horizons" with ISSN NO 2277-5218. The journal, approved by the Panjab University was in the list of UGC approved list of journals. The College management has earmarked Rs. 20 Lakhs as seed money for research.
- INFLIBNET and DELNET services are available.
- Seminars and workshops are regularly held in the College to promote research.
- Under-graduate research is being promoted
- All students at PG level and in some UG subjects are assigned research based assignments.
- Various departments have started the concept of 'Wall Magazine' wherein the students display the research based articles.
- Inductive teaching as a method of instruction is encouraged.
- Students are motivated to present papers at Conferences/Seminars and publish them in reputed Journals. This year, 25 students presented and published papers in reputed journals.


 During 2017-18, a 7 day workshop on Digital Literacy for teaching and non teaching employees of the college was organized by the Department of Computer Science and Application.

- Environmental Audit was conducted by the institution through Net metering in order to determine the extent to which energy generated through Solar Photovoltaic panels had been stored in the grid and reduced the consumption of electricity in monetary terms. It was found that a benefit to the tune of Rs 12.88 lac had been incurred in the past few years.(Annexure vi)
- A Power Back-up of 1.5 kWp has been generated due to the Solar Heating panels which are being used for 32 lights in the hostel premises.
- A partial biodiversity audit has also been done.

Dr. Punam Suri, Honourable President of the DAV College Managing Committee presided over the event. H.E. Shri Ram Nath Kovind unveiled the Foundation Stone of Golden Jubilee Block.
- Add-on Festival has been organized in the college wherein a number of competitions were held.
- International Conference on Happiness: A two-day International conference on the topic "The Soul in Symphony: Spiritual and Pragmatic Aspects of Happiness" was organized on 29-30 January 2018. The conference was a unique endeavour to probe into the harmonious development of faculties towards establishing an enhanced happiness quotient in contemporary times.
- National Seminar on Mirza Ghalib: In a unique endeavor, the PG Department of English organized a national seminar on Mirza Ghalib and invited erudite scholars to discuss the life, poetic vision and style of Ghalib. Highlight of the seminar was musical rendition of Ghalib's poetry.

Annexure II Bio Gas Plant

Context & Relevance:

Alternate Sources of Energy remain indispensable to saving the environment for the posterity.

Objectives:

- Under the aegis of RUSA, the last stage of setting up of a biogas plant in college campus was completed in November 2017.
- This initiative has been taken to manage all the leftover and raw mess food waste generated in the college hostels. The hostel messes along with other food kiosks in the campus generate around 80 kg of solid food waste per day.

Details of Functioning:

The size of the biogas reactor is 5 cubic metre which is of sufficient capacity to utilize all the solid food waste generated in the college. To initiate the functioning of the biogas plant, the plant digester was fed with fresh cow-dung. Once the gas production started after 15 days, the feeding of mess food waste started. Every day approx. 70-80 Kg food waste is collected from the mess and transported to the plant. The required quantity of water is mixed with the solid waste in the inlet tank and discharged to the digester vessel for digestion.

The gas produced through methanogenesis in the digester is collected in the dome. At the top of the dome, a stop cock valve is provided. A flexible pipeline is connected to it up to the canteen kitchen, where it is connected to the biogas stove for cooking food. After the digestion, the digested slurry coming out of the digester in the outlet tank is the rich fertilizer. The digested slurry flows to the outlet drain through the overflow opening in the outlet tank of biogas plant. Outlet drains are connected with composting pits constructed at the outlet of the digester. The slurry flows to the composting pits to augment the degradation of garden waste added in the composting pits.

Evidence of Success: Environment Protection and Financial Sustainability:

- Biogas production has many benefits as a form of renewable energy production, sustainable waste management, and fertilizer production. The college pursues a strategy to directly use biogas generated in biogas digester in their own canteen.
- The installation of biogas plant in the campus helps to save LPG fuel up to ~8 Kg/day and per month LPG produced is ~230 Kg. Hence, through this 'Waste to Energy'

- project, money equivalent to 12 LPG cylinders is recovered, thus proving the worthiness of installation of biogas plant.
- As the slurry from biogas plant is used in the composting pits to augment the
 degradation of garden waste, composting of green waste together with slurry from the
 biogas reactor as described above, is estimated to generate ~2500 kg of manure per
 annum. This has reduced the financial burden of Rs. 7800/- per annum to buy 2400kg
 fertilizer from the market, required by the college to maintain its green areas.

Annexure III

ARTIFICIAL FOREST

Context and Relevance:

- First of its kind in the region, it is a move towards a cleaner, greener and a healthier environment.
- To facilitate our mission, Clean MCM, Green MCM, a step towards Swachh Bharat

Details of Functioning:

Botany Department and NSS volunteers planted about 40 plants of medicinal and economic relevance, including *Simarouba glauca*DC., *Withaniasomnifera* (<u>L.</u>) <u>Dunal</u>, Pyrus*communis<u>L.</u>, <i>Cascabelathevetia* (L.) Lippold, *Butea monosperma*(Lam.) Taub., *Terminaliachebula* Retz., *Sapindusmukorossi* Gaertn, which will ultimately develop into a stratified forest on a patch of land (approximately 95× 30 feet) on the campus.

The following is the step-by-step process of developing the forest:

- 1) It began with the selection of a suitable patch of land.
- 2) Tilling which forms an essential part of preparing the land for any kind of plantation was carried out. The first step involved digging. This was then followed by overturning of soil.
- 3) The third step was adding and mixing of the garden compost (created by maturing cow-dung for 1½ year) to the soil.
- 4) This was then followed by levelling of the stretch.
- 5) After the land preparation pits were dug for the systematic plantation of the saplings.
- A variety of saplings were obtained from the botanical garden at Sarangpur, free of cost with the support of the Forest Department, Chandigarh.
- 7) About 40 saplings were planted on 13.3. 2018. The plantation will now be nurtured by the students and staff of the Department of Botany.

- 1) New Construction
- 2) Renovation and Refurbishment
- 3) New Equipment and Knowledge Resources

Details of Functioning

The clarion call given by our Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi seeking citizen participation in Swachh Bharat Abhiyan has found increasing resonance in the efforts of our institution and we strive to transform it into a mass movement. Conscious of its social responsibility, MCM DAV College for Women has plunged into this initiative in order to contribute towards this national mission. Committed to the cause of 'Swachhata', MCM has undertaken a slew of initiatives inside the campus as well as at the community level including its adopted village- Badheri.

- 35 Washrooms for the students and the staff have been constructed and this is a significant addition to the existing infrastructure.
- Swachhta Internship of 100 hrs received an overwhelming response and the students and faculty members contributed to the cleanliness mission in the surrounding villages.

- Solid Waste Disposal System has been streamlined and RUSA-sponsored Bio gas
 Plant is first of its kind among the academic institutions in the city.

Web Application Development using PHP

The Department of Computer Science and Applications is committed to keep the students updated about latest technologies of application development and enhance their design and development skills. PHP with MySQL is a widely used platform for developing reliable and secure web applications. The department organized a 7-day workshop on "Web Application Development using PHP" from 28th May to 4th June 2018. Sh Pankaj Sharma, Technical Head, NetMax technologies Pvt. Ltd, Chandigarh conducted the workshop. The workshop got overwhelming response from the students of BCA and PGDCA. Total 46 students attended the workshop besides all the teachers of the department.
