The bark of this tree is used to make spoons and ladles, they are used to put ghee into the fire during havans and other Hindu rituals.

- 1. The flowers of this tree are used for treating liver disorders.
- 2. Different parts of this tree are used as timber, fodder, medicine, resin, and dye.
- 3. Charcoal is also obtained from it.
- 4. It is used for well-curbs and water scoops.
- 5. A red exudate obtained from the bark of the tree which hardens into a gum, known as Butea gum, or Bengal kino is used medicinally and also as a dye for tannin.

However, it must be used for medical purposes under medical supervision.
