About the College

Mehr Chand Mahajan DAV College for Women was established in 1968, in memory of Justice Mehr Chand Mahajan, the third Chief Justice of India and former Prime Minister of Kashmir for his exemplary contribution to the field of education, nation building, and the legal system. The foundation stone of the college was laid by the then Vice President of India, Dr. V. V. Giri. Our college has emerged as a coveted seat of learning, academic distinction, and innovation. Presently, we are catering to more than 5000 students from 17 states and many international students. In 2018, we celebrated the landmark 50 years of our Institution with tradition and fervor. The Honorable President of India Sh. Ram Nath Kovind ji visited our college in February 2018 and made our celebrations truly historical. The institution was reaccredited with an "A" grade by NAAC in 2023 and has been identified as Mentor College for non-accredited colleges by NAAC. The institution has been accorded the Star Status by the Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science and Technology, Govt. of India. MCM finds a place of pride in Rank-Band 101-150 for three consecutive years in NIRF Rankings 2021, 2022 & 2023.

Our college was awarded the Cleanest College (Residential) in the country 2018 by Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India and received the third rank in India in 2019 under Citizens Led Initiatives by Ministry of Home and Urban Affairs, Government of India. Our college also won the Best NSS Units award, Best Program Officer and Best NSS volunteer award by Chandigarh Administration during the year 2023 & 2024. MCM was nominated by Ministry of Food Processing Industries, Government of India as the only Technical Institution in Chandigarh for providing training in Bakery & Food Processing under PMFME Scheme.

A total of 98 top positions were bagged by our students in the Panjab University Examinations December 2022 & May 2023. 

NEP 2020

The National Education Policy 2020 is the first education policy of the 21st century and aims to address the many growing developmental imperatives of the country. The Policy proposes the revision and revamping of all aspects of the education structure, including its regulation and governance to create a new system that is aligned with the aspirational goals 21st century education while building upon India's traditions and value systems. Its aim is to develop students into well rounded as well as creative individuals with ethical and Constitutional values, intellectual curiosity, scientific temper, and 21st century capabilities across a range of disciplines including sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities and languages. A quality higher education must enable personal accomplishment and enlightenment, constructive public engagement and productive contribution to the society, preparing students for more meaningful lives, work roles as well as economic independence.

Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programs with Multiple Entry Multiple Exit as per NEP 2020 GENERAL GUIDELINES

1. In adherence to the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the College is introducing a revised Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (CCFUP). This is based on the University Grants Commission's (UGC) guidelines, with a student-centric focus, flexible choice-based credit system, and a multidisciplinary approach. This framework also provides multiple entry and exit options, facilitating students to align their education with their career aspirations by choosing subjects/fields of their interest.

1.1 Certification and Duration of Study with Multiple Entry Multiple Exit (MEME)

The undergraduate degree will have a flexible duration of either three or four years, with multiple exit options during this period. The table below outlines the various certifications a student can earn at different stages of their undergraduate study:

1.1 Multiple Entry and Multiple Exit Options

The structure provides students with the flexibility to enter, exit, and re-enter the programme at various stages, each with its corresponding certification as in 1.1 above.

The undergraduate curriculum will include credit-based courses and projects centred around community engagement, environmental education, and value-based education. Additionally, students will have opportunities for internships with local industries, businesses, artists, craftspeople, as well as research internships with faculty and researchers at their own or other Higher Education Institutions (HEIs)/research institutions. These practical experiences are integral to enhancing students' learning and employability.

Note: a) Students who choose to exit the programme after the completion of the first two semesters must undertake a work-based learning/internship during the summer term. This internship, worth 4 credits, is a requirement for the award of the Undergraduate Certificate.

b) The maximum time in which a student will be allowed to complete the Degree is Seven Years.

1.1 Semester and Credit Structure

A standard academic year is divided into two semesters, each semester spanning a minimum of 15 weeks. In addition to this, an eightweek summer term is also included in the academic calendar.

During the summer term, students are encouraged to engage in internships, apprenticeships or work-based vocational education and training. This is particularly beneficial for students who plan to exit after two or four semesters of study.

1.1 Eligibility for Undergraduate Programmes

Specific eligibility criteria for pursuing undergraduate degrees in the Arts, Science or Commerce disciplines are specified in the NEP Regulations of PU on their website.

1.2 First Year Undergraduate Program Structure

In the inaugural year of the undergraduate program, students will have the opportunity to create a multidisciplinary academic plan. This will include the following elements:

1.1 Choice of Courses

Undergraduate students will make course selections from list provided by the College. The choices will fall into categories as outlined below:

1.1.1 Major Course:

This is the primary subject area a student wishes to delve into during their undergraduate course. It is the area of study that the student is keenly interested in and may wish to pursue as a career. Students can be permitted to change their major within the broad discipline at the end of the second semester, providing them with ample time to explore interdisciplinary courses during their first year.

^{1.} Students will see the specific guidelines and list of courses offered by the College.

^{2.} Every student will ensure that she is taking specified number of courses in each component of the Curriculum Framework to complete 24 credits. Record of courses chosen by the student in every component of the Curriculum Framework will be kept.

1.1.1 Minor Course:

This is a secondary area of study that complements the student's chosen Major. Students who complete a sufficient number of courses in a discipline or an interdisciplinary area of study other than their chosen Major will qualify for a Minor in that discipline or interdisciplinary area. A student may declare their choice of Minor and vocational stream at the end of the second semester.

1.1.2 Multidisciplinary Course:

All undergraduate students are required to complete three introductory-level courses relating to any of the broad disciplines. Students are not allowed to choose or repeat courses already taken as their proposed Major and Minor stream under this category.

1.1.3 Ability Enhancement Course (AEC):

These are Modern Indian Language (MIL) & English language courses focused on enhancing language and communication skills. The courses aim to enable students to acquire and demonstrate core linguistic skills, including communication, critical reading and expository and academic writing skills.

1.1.4 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):

These courses aim to impart practical skills, hands-on training, soft skills, etc., to enhance the employability of students.

1.1.5 Value Added Course (VAC):

These courses are designed to provide extra skills or knowledge beyond the standard curriculum, often tailored towards enhancing employability, promoting entrepreneurship, or developing personal and professional skills.

1.2 Course Components

Courses will be comprised of one or more of the following components depending on the requirement of a specific discipline:

- 1. Lecture
- 2. Tutorial
- 3. Practicum
- 4. Seminar/Internship/Studio Activities/Field Practice/Projects/Community Engagement and Service

1.3: Research Project/Dissertation Requirement for 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research)

For students enrolled in the 4-Year Bachelor's Degree program (Honours with Research), it is mandatory to undertake a research project under the supervision of a faculty member in the fourth year. This research project is to be initiated and completed in the eighth semester of the program.

1.4 Inclusion of Other Activities in VAC/SEC

The Value-Added Course (VAC) and Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) components of the undergraduate curriculum will include a diverse range of extracurricular activities that enrich students' learning experience and contribute to their personal and professional development. These activities will include but are not limited to:

- Participation in the National Service Scheme (NSS),
- Engagement with the National Cadet Corps (NCC),
- Involvement in adult education or literacy initiatives.
- Mentoring school students,
- Participation in other community service or outreach activities.

IMPORTANT REGULATIONS AND GUIDELINES FOR STUDENTS

- 1: Award of Undergraduate Degrees: A student will be awarded an Undergraduate Degree upon securing a total of 144 credits within three years. An Undergraduate Degree with Honours will be awarded upon securing a total of 192 credits.
- 2: Credit Completion: Each student must aim to complete a requirement of 24 credits per semester or 48 credits in one academic year, in accordance with PU regulations for courses under NEP-2020.
- 3: Course Selection: A student will select courses from the basket/lists offered by the College.
- 4: Major and Minor Course Selection: By the end of the second semester, students may decide to continue with their chosen major or request a change. The major course allows for in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline.
- 5: Change of Major: Students will be allowed to change their major within the broad discipline at the end of the second semester, allowing sufficient time to explore interdisciplinary courses during the first year.
- 6: Language Requirement: Every student will choose two languages, including English, irrespective of the chosen Degree.
- 7: **Updates and Amendments**: Since this scheme is being introduced for the first time in the 2024-25 session, it is subject to modifications as per UGC Guidelines. **Any changes in regulations in subsequent years after admission to the 1st Year will be applicable for these students retrospectively.** Students should stay informed about any updates to ensure compliance with updated guidelines made by the competent authority.





a) RULES REGARDING MIGRATION FROM THE AFFILIATED COLLEGE TO ANOTHER

- 1.1. Local migration of students shall ordinarily not be allowed only for valid reasons.
- 1.2. No student who has joined one college shall be admitted to another college during the same course unless:
- the Principals of the colleges concerned agree and the application is forwarded to the Registrar for sanction, accompanied by a prescribed fee which shall in no case be refunded, and
- (ii) the principal of the college from which he intends to migrate has given the leaving certificate.

No application for transfer shall be entertained unless the student's statement is supported by his Principal who, in the case of migration of

- students provisionally promoted state all the relevant facts on the application.
- 2. A student who is conditionally promoted shall not be admitted to a higher class by the Principal of the other college, on migration.
- 3. If the applicant be a detained student or one who has been degraded or against whom any disciplinary action has been taken, etc., the Principal shall specifically mention remarks.
- The college leaving certificate shall not be given by the Principal until the transfer has been notified by the Registrar. No admission without such sanction shall be considered valid.
- 5. When migration of a student from one college to another college has been sanctioned, he/she must join the new college within 15 days. Provided that if a student does not avail himself of the migration, within fifteen days from the date of receipt of the letter by the Principals of the colleges concerned, he/she shall have to apply afresh and pay fresh fee in order to revalidate his/her previous migration.
- 6. If a student changes his mind after putting in his application for migration, he/she must inform the colleges concerned as also the University immediately.
- 7. If the student changes his/her mind after migration has been sanctioned by the University, he/she must apply for re-migration and follow the entire procedure prescribed by the University once again if he/she has joined the other college. If he/ she has not, he/she must apply for cancellation of the migration certificate through the Principal of the college concerned and return his migration certificate.
- 8. No migration certificate can be issued unless the student has been registered with the University.

FOREIGN STUDENTS

- They must have a valid passport and a valid Student Visa (if applicable).
- They must have the equivalence certificate and eligibility certificate from Deputy Registrar, Panjab University, Chandigarh.
- Foreign Students will follow all rules and guidelines of Panjab University and the College.
